Shelter-in-Place

What is a shelter-in-place protocol for?
When it's safer inside than outside, usually due to an environmental incident or condition, like a hazardous material spill. What do you do? Listen for instructions as to what kind of response to take. You may be instructed to use that mysterious duct tape and plastic from your bucket to seal windows and doorframe.

Quiz for the Teacher

What should you do when you see someone in your school without an ID badge? Choose one: You should say...

- 1. "Hi, would you please watch my kids for me for a minute while I run back to my classroom for something?

Yes, you can!

Pull the fire alarm yourself if you see fire. Don't wait to tell the front office or an administrator.

Call 911 yourself and even call for a Lockdown yourself. Example: If you really had a bad feeling about the situation described above (see Quiz for the teacher), you could call 911 and/or call for a Lockdown from your own intercom (if you have the technological capability).

What should you do if a student is missing? Call 911. What if the student is missing, but it's only been 15 minutes? Call 911. But, what if he's a trickster and you're sure he's just trying to be funny? Call 911. Police and fire would rather rush to the school and then find out the student is asleep in the closet than be called too late.

Lightning myths? What do you think?

- Lightning never strikes the same place twice.

- Everyone struck by lightning dies.
- Most lightning strikes happen on the golf course. I don't play golf, so I don't have to worry.
- Lightning victims hold an "electric charge," so it is dangerous for me to try to help them.
- As long as I'm in a covered space, I'm safe from lightning during a thunderstorm.
- Lightning strikes only during heavy rain.
- In a thunderstorm, it is safe for me to talk on the phone or take a bath.
- Carrying an umbrella does not increase my risk of being struck by lightning.
